### From our Spiritual Assistant:

Peace and all Good.

Remember that Francis was torn between Praying and Preaching. In *The Little Flowers* (Chapter XVI,) he asks Brother Masseo to go to both Clare and Sylvester and ask them whether Francis should spend his life as a contemplative hermit or go out and preach. Both saints send the same response back (through Masseo,) "The Lord says, go and tell Brother Francis that he has called him to this state not to save merely his own soul but that he may produce fruits in those of others, and that through him many souls be saved."

You are called to be Franciscan not for yourself but to "produce fruits" in others.

Remember that Francis went out and preached - but he also set aside time to go away and pray. It's not 'either-or;' it's both prayer and 'working in the world.'

The following is a reflection on Matthew 7.21-29 (go from Gospel to life.) It never mentions Francis, but is inspired by Clare's and Sylvester's response to his question.

Should we seek only Faith or must Faith also be expressed in Works?

In Matthew 7.21-29, the man cries "Lord, Lord," because he HAS faith: he believes in Jesus and prays, and wants to follow Jesus... but Jesus says that this hypothetical man will NOT enter the Kingdom of Heaven - unless he DOES the will of "Our Father in heaven." The hypothetical man has faith, but NOT the works that faith would generate.

And the alternative may also be a problem. Jesus also talks of others who do such works: who prophesy in Jesus' name, and cast out demons and do many works of power in Jesus' name... but will not enter Kingdom of Heaven EITHER: Jesus says to (and of) such, "I never knew you; go away from me." These ones, it seems, have works but not faith.

Faith and works is not an EITHER-OR. There is a complex relationship connecting Works to Faith. Each expresses the other; neither is whole without the other. The message for us is to be conscious of both Faith and Works: to nurture both, to value both, to practice both - and to APPRECIATE the fundamental way the two are interconnected.

Jesus gives us the parable of a house built on rock OR on sand specifically to reinforce the importance of Works in our Faith life. The house built on sand is a simile for a foolish person who DOES hear Jesus' words, but doesn't ACT on them doesn't WORK on them. The WORKING is just as important as the believing. The house built on rock is a simile for a wise person who BOTH believes and works.

There's a suggestion (in the parable) that DOING THE WORKS may be a starting place, a foundation: a Rock on which we can build stronger, more resilient faith. Building on sand is trying to sustain faith WITHOUT letting it produce works. Faith must be physically expressed by our hands and feet and our strength and our proclamation... so that it will not be washed away in the storms and winds of life.

What works? Jesus lists prophesy, and casting out demons, and great works of power as examples. And we need to be open to doing such great works when called upon to do so. But we also sustain and develop our faith with ordinary... everyday works: such as; really listening to each other, putting the other first, doing to others as we would have done to us, respecting all people (not just people who are easy to respect.) We sustain our faith by standing up for all life, and by feeding the hungry and visiting the sick and the prisoner.

Do whatever The Father reveals as His will for you... then Jesus will not say to you (or to me), "I never knew you; get away from me." Rather He will place us at His right hand, and say to us, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." (Matthew 25)
