A MOMENT WITH THE MNISTER

We recently celebrated the Feast of the Stigmata of St. Francis, on September 17.

St. Francis saw in the poor and crucified Christ, to His last breath and drop of blood what He meant when He said; "I am the way the truth and the life." (Jn.14:6) Jesus' love for humanity and for each one of us was this great. The desire to love like Jesus, was so great in St. Francis, that he prayed the following;

"My Lord Jesus Christ, I pray You to grant me two graces before I die; the first is that during my life I may feel in my soul and in my body as much as possible the pain, which You Dear Jesus, sustained in the hour of Your most bitter Passion. The second is that I may feel in my heart, as much as possible, that excessive love with which You, O Son of God, were inflamed in willingly enduring such suffering for us sinners."

Thus St. Francis became so identified with Christ that he became an "alter Christus," or another Christ. The Stigmata became a visible sign of St. Francis' complete cooperation with God's grace. The wounds in Francis' hands, feet and side, like those of Jesus, teach us the goal of Franciscan formation and our Secular Franciscan way of life. We too are to become "other Christs" and we must love God and each other this much. These are lofty goals to aspire to, no doubt, but each day is a new chance to start over and begin again to empty ourselves of worldliness and fill ourselves with Christ.

I was walking through downtown Guelph on my way to a doctor's appointment. Guelph is like any other city during the day, filled with people bustling here and there. There are also the benches, often filled with younger folk with their bicycles leaned up against the backs of the seats. Someone is asking a passer-by for money for a coffee. The pigeons are flying overhead and often landing in the "Family Fountain." There is graffiti on some of the sides of the buildings, and I marvel at the artistic ability of whoever is responsible. Away I go, headed towards the office when, with my head down, I notice something written on the sidewalk in fairly large letters. It is written in yellow and white and the person who had done it, not only printed a phrase, but adorned it with flowers and curls and underlines. Usually I don't like to look at any profanity but something turned my head to read the message. And there it was:



BE KIND TO ONE ANOTHER



Well, a smile came over my face and I thought, what a fool I was for doubting that a sidewalk message might teach me a lesson!!! Those five little words changed my mood for the day! Whoever wrote the words had also done it in chalk so that it wouldn't stain the sidewalk. Thoughtful? Perhaps, or maybe that is the only writing instrument they had available. Whatever the reason, I for one, of many in downtown Guelph that day, was touched with a sense of God's goodness. I almost skipped into the doctor's office full of joy. I had been taught many things that morning - not least of all, that evangelization takes place where and when you least expect it.

I want to be filled with the love of Christ as St. Francis was. To empty myself of stress and worry and of misjudgement and ignorance, to open myself to the laughter and joy of others around me and the often missed signs of God's work present everyday in my life.

Please take time to join in a Transitus Celebration being offered this year in several locations. As Psalm 116:15 says, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints."

VICE MINISTER'S ARTICLE Justice, Peace, & Integrity of Creation

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

While the advent of a national website on JPIC (http://www.franciscanvoicecanada.com) is a

great development, there are many of us who cannot access this resource, but who use this newsletter as a primary source. For those who can access the internet, links have been provided. Consequently we will try and feature current articles from the JPIC website here on our newsletter. This issue the article is most timely: the plight of Christians in the Middle East.

In response to the need for emergency assistance and reconstruction in the Middle East, three Canadian Catholic agencies are collecting funds for the suffering people of Iraq, Gaza and Syria: the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace (CCODP), CNEWA Canada, and Aid to the Church in Need. The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) and Canadian dioceses are encouraging Catholics to support the three agencies in their work.

The Pontifical Council speaks out against terror in name of religion. Haaretz picked up on this and wrote:

"The Vatican's call came as Egypt's top religious authority, Grand Mufti Shawqi Allam, condemned Islamic State as a corrupt, extremist organisation that is damaging Islam."

Iyad Ameen Madani, secretary general of The Organization of Islamic Cooperation condemned the actions in Mosul and Nineveh. He said the ISIS "forced displacement is a crime that cannot be tolerated; and that the practices of ISIS have nothing to do with Islam and its principles that call for justice, kindness, fairness, freedom of faith and coexistence."

Who are the moderate Muslims? Where are they and how can we support and encourage them to speak out?

To start, you could read Raheel Raza, a Sunni Muslim married to a Shia Muslim. She is the author of "Their Jihad, Not My Jihad: a Muslim Canadian woman speaks out" and "How Many Moderate Muslims Does it Take to Give a Message?" (Look for both at your local public library)

"#WeAreN" campaign reclaims Arabic letter for Iraq's persecuted Christians

A global social media campaign is using the Arabic letter Nun to show support for Christians being driven out of the Iraqi city of Mosul as well as Nineveh, where Jonah in the Old Testament famously preached repentance. The "N" is the first letter of "Nasrani," or Nazarene, a common Arabic term for Christians.

Using a hashtag of #WeAreN, social media users are claiming the letter, which reportedly is being painted on property owned by Christians in Mosul, who have now fled the city. Radicals from the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria, or ISIS, had demanded Christians either convert to Islam, pay a tax critics call excessive, or face execution.

Under such threats, the last Christians in Mosul, which for two millennia hosted Christian believers, have reportedly left the city, according to AlJazeera.com.



POPE FRANCIS AT MASS:

"Christian life simple, radical"

2014-09-24 Vatican Radio [excerpts]

...the Holy Father focused on the simplicity of the Christian life and the Gospel's call to radical simplicity in life and action.

"... These are the two conditions in order to follow Jesus: to listen to the word of God, and to put it into practice. This is the Christian life – nothing more. Simple, simple. Maybe we've made it a little difficult, with many explanations that no one understands, but the Christian life is thus: listening to the Word of God and practicing it."

... The point is not to hear casually, but to bend our ears

- really to listen to the word of God, which we find in the Gospel – the pages of which need to be heard, and heeded, rather than merely read by rote "Listening to the Word of God," said the Holy Father, "means reading it and

then asking, 'What does this say to me? How does this speak to my heart? What is God saying to me, with this word?" This, said Pope Francis, is a life-changing line of questioning:

"Every time we do this – each time we open the Gospel and read a passage and ask ourselves: 'Is God speaking to me with this? Is He saying something to me?' – and if He is saying something, what is it that He is saying?' This is [what it means] to listen to the Word of God: to listen with your ears and hear with your heart. Open your heart to the Word of God. ... God not only speaks to all: yes, he does speak to all of us – but He also speaks to every one of us – to each of us. The Gospel was written for each of us."

The Holy Father went on to say that putting into practice what we have heard is "is not easy" and that "it is easier to live a mellow life without worrying about the exigencies of the Word of God."

FROM THE TREASURER

Blessed Angela (Aniela) Salawa Patroness of Secular Franciscans in Poland September 9, 1881 - March 12, 1922



Recently, on September 9' we celebrated the feast of blessed Angela Salawa. Her first name, in Polish, is actually Aniela.

In October of 1992, during the Second Chapter of the National Council, she was chosen the Patroness of Secular Franciscans in Poland.

Blessed Angela lived her short 40 years on earth, during two centuries, 19 years in the 19th century and 21 years in the 20th century. She received the spiritual formation typical to the 19th century and followed it, yet she was open to accepting the changes of the next century; for example, the decrees of St. Pious X regarding frequent Holy Communion. In her short live she spent 16 years in her home village Siepraw, 20 years in Cracow where she worked as a maid. During her five last years on earth she was very sick, for four of them, bedridden. She looked at her poor health and later constant illnesses as a gift from God.

She chose the Secular Franciscan Order for her live, after considering the Dominican Tertiary and the Carmelite Tertiary. She went to Holy Confession once a week, and she participated daily in a Holy Mass, always when she could. It was her love for the Crucified Lord and her love for simple and poor life that brought her to the Seraphic Order.

She joined the Secular Franciscan Order on March 15, 1912, and professed her vows on August 6, 1913.

She dedicated her life to others, gave her own little money and food to the even more needy, and she nourished and fed their souls, not just their bodies. By the example of her simple, virtuous life she brought so many people to Christ.

She always kept secrets confined to her, and was very far from vanity and wasting time on empty and trivial matters. Blessed Angela is an example to us all, that life obstacles can be overcome with grace.

At her 1991 beatification in Cracow Saint Pope John Paul II said, "It is in this city that she worked, that she suffered and that her holiness came to maturity. While connected to the spirituality of St. Francis, she showed an extraordinary responsiveness to the action of the Holy Spirit"

In her presence, nothing bad could be said about another person; she would say, "Everyone is seen by God, each has their own vices and shortcomings."


"never demand anything from anyone, and never refuse when asked for help."

YOUTH ANIMATOR'S LETTER





One of the greatest joys I have is being a high school Theology teacher. To some, teaching high school sounds about as much fun as having a root canal, but to me, it is an honour and privilege to learn from such honest human beings. Six years ago, I started a Teen Homeless Night fundraiser for the Out of The Cold program in our community. Each student is asked to donate a minimum of \$25 to sleep

outside. We normally have to cap at 80 students every year! The support has been tremendous and it is one event many students have come to look forward to year after year; perhaps not so much my aging body, but their joy gets me through it (and to coffee the next day)

The evening begins with a Mock Soup Kitchen, and then we leave the warmth of the school and begin to construct our lodgings outside using cardboard, rope, tape and tarps. We spend the evening in small groups discussing how we can help the disadvantaged in our community and spend some time in prayer asking God to bless us and others as we try to follow in the footsteps of St. Francis and his love of the poor.

This year, I have tried to schedule this evening as close to the feast day of St. Francis for two reasons: one, because it will be my sixth anniversary as a professed Secular Franciscan; and two, so that we could pray with the poor under the leadership of our seraphic father. With other conflicting events, it has been booked for October 9—10. Sure it is the week after, but I feel that his spirit will be with us as we celebrate the example he gave us in doing the best for the poor. I believe this evening allows students to analyze their own lives and how they could more effectively live out the challenge offered by Pope Francis in the quote above.

The Guatemala March Break, 2015 Mission Trip is full! We have youth from North Bay to Toronto participating and I could not be more thrilled to be able to offer this program again. New this time, we will be going to assist the poor at the Guatemala City Dump where over one million people live! As always, we will have the opportunity to join the Poor Clare's at Mass....one of my personal favourite activities!!!


