Clare, brilliant by her bright merits, by the brightness of her great glory in heaven, and by the brilliance of her sublime miracles on earth, shines brilliantly.

Clare, her strict and lofty way of religious life glows here on earth, while the magnitude of her eternal rewards radiates from above and her virtue begins to dawn upon all mortal beings with magnificent signs.

Clare: here [below] *she was endowed with the privilege of the most exalted poverty; on high she is repaid by an inestimable source of treasure;*

[Clare]: she is shown full devotion and immense honor by all.

Clare: her brilliant deeds distinguished her here [on earth].

Clare: while on high the fullness of the divine light shines on her.

Clare: her amazing works of wonder make her known to the Christian people.

Clare, endowed with so many brilliant titles! Bright even before your conversion, brighter in your manner of living, brighter still in your enclosed life, and brilliant in splendor after the course of your mortal life!

O how great is the vibrancy of this light and how intense is the brilliance of its illumination! While this light remained certainly in a hidden enclosure, it emitted sparkling rays outside. It should not be surprising that a light so enkindled, so illuminating could not be kept hidden without shining brilliantly and giving bright light in the house of the Lord: nor could a vessel filled with perfume be concealed so it would not give fragrance and suffuse the Lord's house with a sweet fragrance.

Moreover, since with her harshness she broke the alabaster jar of her body in the severity of her cloistered solitude, the whole aura of the Church was thoroughly imbued with the fragrance of her sanctity.



Hail Full of Grace

This year, 2017, the hundredth anniversary of Our Blessed Mother's visit to Fatima, there is a plethora of infor-



mation written about her, and there are celebrations ongoing throughout the year and throughout the world. Information is forthcoming not only about the Fatima apparitions, but also about her many other appearances throughout the years. There is nothing that I can write which has not yet been written, so my focus will be on my life with her.

As a young girl I remember my mother's devotion to our Blessed Mother, and getting us together for the family Rosary. At High School, the Rosary was said immediately on returning to school after lunch. Unhappily, my devotion to her abated over a number of years, but although I may have forgotten her - said the Rosary infrequently or without thought - she never forgot me. She gazed lovingly at me in Medjugorje and gave me a memento - the Miraculous medal - not only for myself but for others.

My favorite image of her is as "Our Lady of



Grace". She brings to mind incomparable beauty, gentleness, and compassion... and an allencompassing love. Through her hands flow all the graces from Jesus that one can ever wish for. When God the Father created her, He made

her the most perfect being to be the mother of His Son. His son, Jesus, on the cross gave her to us as a parting gift, when, seeing His mother and John the disciple standing at the foot of the cross, He said: *"Woman behold thy son"*; and to the disciple: *"Behold thy mother."*

How much thought is given to what we say when we pray or ask Mary's intercession? Have we really thought of, and accepted her or recognized her as our mother?

I have learnt to place my trust in her intercession, going to her in my "ups and downs". Remembering my dependence (in my youth) on my mother, I have transferred that dependency on my Heavenly mother and go to her for all my needs - recognizing myself as a young child in need of her mother. For this reason I have made a Total Consecration to the Immaculata. Maximilian Kolbe says that entrustment to her makes us totally hers. Pope St. John Paul II's motto, *Totus tuus*, is a reminder of his great love for her.

One of my favorite Franciscan stories is about Friar Leo's dream about St. Francis going up the red ladder to Heaven. He was encouraging his brothers to climb up too, but they were unable to and were falling off. He directed them to try climbing up the white ladder on which the Blessed Mother stood, pitiful and kind - welcoming the Friars.

When my friends are depressed, in need or even searching for misplaced items, I always encourage them to: GO TO THE MOTHER. She always comes through. Peace

Our Lady's request of these young innocents should penetrate our hearts, while shaming our lack of faith. "*Are you willing to give yourselves entirely to God?*" she asked. Their fiat produced another awesome statement – "*Then go, you have much to suffer.*" It sounds pretty grim until you realise that true joy comes only from a giving sacrificial heart. Bringing "life to gospel and gospel to life" requires this of all of us.

His desire to be with God led him to Mount Alverna where the relationship was made complete, all the bitterness of his life was made sweet: beginning with the leper, to the wolf of Gubbio, right to the altar of God as a Saint. A true "Alter Christus" as many popes have said of him.

This is the goal of all who live the Gospel to life and life to Gospel.

YOUTH ANIMATOR

Just by way of introduction, my name is Christopher Elliott, and I am the new Youth Animator for the Trillium Regional Fraternity.



It was a great blessing for me to be asked to take on this responsibility which just so happened to coincide with the start of my new job as Youth Minister for St. Timothy's Church in Toronto.

A big part of my job will be finding ways to share our Franciscan spirituality with teenagers and young adults. To that end I am working on creating a presentation on the lives of Sts. Francis and Clare, and all things Franciscan, that I will share with parishes, schools and youth groups in our region. My hope is that the young people of today will find the lives of St. Francis and St. Clare just as inspiring today as they were over 800 years ago. If you would like me to visit your parish when this presentation is ready and share it with your youth group I would be more than happy to do that!

The other project that I am working on as Youth Animator is the formation of a Franciscan Fraternity for young people. For this group to flourish it must be built around a clear purpose that inspires youth and makes a positive impact in our world. The prayer I have included (*above to the right*) forms the central ideals around which this group would revolve.

To that end, I am praying and discerning about the possibility of planning a Franciscan mission trip for youth ages 17-21 for some time next year. Those who take part would have to attend monthly meetings to prepare for the mission as well as receive formation in Franciscan spirituality. They would also be encouraged to get involved with their local fraternity who would support them by helping to collect donations for the mission trip both financial and material. We hope that calling these young people to mission will be the start of a group called "Young Franciscan Missionaries," that will continue and grow with God's blessing.


And may God bless us with enough foolishness to believe that we can make a difference in this world, so that we can do what others claim cannot be done.

Capuchin Friars across North America rejoice and anticipate the upcoming Beatification of: Venerable Solanus Casey ofm, Cap. in November 2017.


